SCHOOL PROFILE

Burbridge School is a vibrant Education Support, Independent Public School for students from Kindergarten to Year 12. We are proud to be the first Model MOVE Site in Western Australia. 'MOVE' (Mobility Opportunities Via Education/Experience) is an internationally acclaimed research-based mobility program that combines functional movement with instructional processes. It is designed to help students with physical disabilities acquire increased abilities to sit, stand, walk and transition, while engaging in meaningful learning experiences. We see every child as a unique individual with the potential to learn and achieve. Our specialist team of teachers and education assistants provide caring, innovative and personalised learning programs to prepare our students for a meaningful and positive future. Our close family partnerships and welcoming school community are essential features of Burbridge School of which we are proud of. We work alongside families in all aspects of their child's education in the development of individualised, relevant and meaningful learning goals that reflect our students' specific needs.

Burbridge School takes pride in delivering a curriculum that is consistent with current best practice for students with special educational needs. Evidence-based programs ensure our students thrive. Overarching all learning is a focus on the development of:

- · Effective communication skills,
- · Pro-social and emotional skills,
- · Independence skills; and
- Mobility skills.

Burbridge School provides a stimulating, caring and respectful educational environment in which students feel safe and can thrive emotionally, physically, socially and academically. Many of our students have highly complex needs.

Our students benefit from the purpose-built, specialist facilities at Burbridge School including a multisensory room, hydrotherapy pool, gym, enterprise garden, library, fully accessible kitchen, and two large, fenced playgrounds that are accessible to all students. We have a case management approach that ensures expertise, from highly skilled specialist staff, in Behaviour, Communication and Mobility. Our teaching teams are further supported by the school psychologist.



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

I am pleased to present the Burbridge School Annual Report for the 2023 school year. This report highlights our achievements, progress, and commitment to providing exceptional education and support to our students and families. The Annual Report is an integral part of the school's reporting and accountability cycle which provides you with a snapshot of how our school performed in 2023. This report was written with the input of staff who are responsible for specific aspects of school operation.

High Quality Teaching & Learning: In 2023 Burbridge School became an internationally accredited MOVE Model Site, proudly one of two in the whole of Australia. We have been delivering the MOVE Program, a movement-based educational program, specifically designed for students from all age groups, with physical disabilities since 2015. Our vision is to help students with mobility difficulties and complex needs develop greater independence via improved mobility skills.

Burbridge staff were keen to celebrate the achievements and successes of the students and whole school outcomes. The data was collected through formal assessments, surveys and other sources which helped us to determine our strengths, identify areas of concern, and plan for future teaching and learning opportunities. We are proud of the professionalism displayed by our staff as well as all the hard work they undertook to provide your children with the best possible school environment in 2023.

Relationships and Partnerships: The Burbridge School community plays a vital role in our success. We appreciate the active involvement of parents, caregivers, and community members on our school board and P&C. 


STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance has long been recognised as a major factor of student success at school. The Department of Education recognises this and measures all schools against a minimum requirement of 90% attendance.

Our aim is to have as many students as possible attending above this benchmark.


In Semester 2 2023, regular attendance rose by 13.3% across the school. Of all absences, 83% were authorised and 15% were unauthorised.

This is a significant improvement on the 2022 data and is directly attributed to the introduction of clear attendance plans, the use of Alternative Attendance Agreements and case management meetings for all families along with timely follow up of absences by families and staff.




WHOLE SCHOOL ACHIEVEMENT DATA

Protective Behaviours

100% of students participate in the Department of Education WA and Protective Behaviours WA Inc's curriculum; *Protective Behaviours: Feeling safe, Staying safe.* Protective Behaviours is a life skills and personal safety program that aims to strengthen the resilience of children as they grow and develop. It focuses on giving children essential life skills and strategies to identify, respond to and seek assistance if faced with abusive and/or potentially unsafe situations and on teaching children how to avoid unsafe situations. The Protective Behaviours curriculum delivered at Burbridge School has been adapted for students with special needs. It is differentiated in delivery to meet the need of each student. All students have a Protective behaviour goal in their IEP/ITP and are assessed annually using the Protective Behaviours Skills checklist.

Road Map of Communicative Competencies (ROCC) Data

All students at Burbridge are assessed on the Road Map of Communicative Competencies (ROCC) Assessment.



68.6% of students were identified as Emergent Communicators. 31.42% of students identified as Transitional Communicators. In the 2023 school year there were no independent/competent communicators.

87% of students require additional communication strategies to meet basic communication needs with 31.43% of students using body language as their primary mode of communication.

NATIONAL SCHOOLS' OPINION SURVEY

The National Schools Opinion Survey was due to be conducted in Semester 2 2023. This tool was decommissioned in January 2023 by Education Services Australia. We are awaiting a new tool before recommencing the School Opinion Survey process.







